1 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: We are  
2 together this afternoon so I can find out where  
3 you're at with the status with regard to the fourth  
4 non-substantial change determination request  
5 reflected as limited to the Palmer property. It's my  
6 understanding that the parties have been in  
7 discussions and that there have been some proposals  
8 for a hearing date; is that correct?

9 MS. HAYDEN: That is correct. Go ahead,  
10 David.

11 MR. GRAYCK: Yes. Attorney Hayden and I  
12 just discussed earlier today some dates, and I think  
13 we are generally in agreement that we're going to try  
14 and have a MOU between the parties completed by April  
15 29th, and failing that Kim followed up with Mr.  
16 Heindel and he is available May 11 and 12, could be  
17 available for a site visit late in the day on the  
18 10th. So those are the dates that would work for me,  
19 my clients, and my expert.

20 MS. HAYDEN: So if -- this is Kim  
21 Hayden. If I may just give the Hearing Officer a  
22 status update where we are, the parties have been  
23 working diligently for the last several months to  
24 resolve this issue, and Mr. Heindel on behalf of the  
25 Palmers and VHB on behalf of Vermont Gas have

1 developed a mitigation proposal which would involve a  
2 curtain drain which I never knew what that was, but  
3 it's basically a pipe to drain water as well as a  
4 swale.

5           There are some -- and, David, I think  
6 you and I agree we are more than 50 percent there.  
7 There's some outstanding issues and that's why we are  
8 suggesting a MOU date of next Friday. We would like  
9 to reserve the opportunity -- parallel in the event  
10 some of these other issues can't be resolved, and I  
11 do think they are resolvable, but if they could not  
12 be resolved, we would like to have a hearing date  
13 reserved now. Vermont Gas needs to access the site  
14 to begin construction in early June and, therefore,  
15 we were looking for a hearing date in May, the first  
16 several weeks of May, and I think we would be asking,  
17 if possible, that the full Board be at that hearing  
18 if we have to have an evidentiary hearing only  
19 because if we have a Hearing Officer-only ruling, it  
20 would be a Proposal for Decision which would have to  
21 be presented in the Board, and that two-step process  
22 could delay Vermont Gas's ability to construct on  
23 time and on budget given the sequencing of where this  
24 section of pipe is expected to be built.

25           So that's kind of an overview of where

1 we are. The parties also have discussed the issue of  
2 non-substantial change. If we're able to reach a  
3 MOU, I think we're in agreement that a  
4 non-substantial change order with conditions with  
5 mitigation and the details of the mitigation would  
6 become conditions of the order. I believe we've also  
7 -- David and I spoke this morning. We're also in  
8 agreement that if we can't reach a full MOU, we would  
9 present the Board with stipulated agreements so that  
10 we could narrow the issues for the day of the  
11 hearing, if there needs to be a hearing. So we would  
12 have a partial -- at the very least a partial MOU,  
13 which I'm guessing would be the -- essentially the  
14 design of the curtain drain mitigation.

15 Trying to think. David, there was one  
16 other item that you and I discussed. The parties are  
17 in agreement, meaning the Palmers and Vermont Gas,  
18 that we don't need additional discovery. We would be  
19 prepared to file by Friday supplemental testimony  
20 with the curtain drain drawings for the Board, and  
21 again hopefully would have a MOU by next Friday, and,  
22 if not, I think David and I can work together to  
23 provide stipulated facts in time for the hearing.

24 MR. GRAYCK: Right, and I would not be  
25 able to do that this Friday. If you're talking about

1 a week from this Friday, that's okay, but if you're  
2 talking about prefiled testimony or stipulated  
3 testimony by this Friday, my schedule does not allow  
4 for that. I'm sorry, Kim.

5 MS. HAYDEN: Sorry, David, I should have  
6 been more clear. The Vermont Gas would file its  
7 supplemental filing this Friday and then I would  
8 envision a MOU next Friday or a partial MOU, and any  
9 additional filings by the Palmers, if we don't reach  
10 full agreement, would be filed next Friday as well.

11 MR. GRAYCK: Okay. I mean the other  
12 alternative is a week from this Friday for the  
13 Palmers -- make it the following Monday so if we find  
14 ourselves in negotiations on Friday --

15 MS. HAYDEN: That's fine. So the dates  
16 we're talking about are stipulation partial or full  
17 by the 29th of May (sic) which is a Friday, and then  
18 if we don't have a full MOU by that date, the Palmers  
19 would file their filing on Monday the 2nd, I'm sorry,  
20 and then Vermont Gas's filing would be this Friday.  
21 We've been working on these plans for a while so  
22 we're ready to submit this by this Friday the 22nd.

23 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. Got it.  
24 So April 22nd VGS files additional information  
25 regarding the pipe and on the 29th, if there is a

1 MOU, it will be filed on that day. If there is no  
2 MOU, on Monday the 2nd the Palmers would file  
3 supplemental testimony.

4 MR. GRAYCK: Correct.

5 MS. HAYDEN: Yes, and I think that's  
6 correct, and then David and I would also, whether it  
7 was that Monday the 2nd or a day or two after that,  
8 but prior to the hearing we would file a statement of  
9 stipulated facts so that we can narrow -- we're down  
10 to a handful of issues, so that we could narrow the  
11 issues for the hearing.

12 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: That wouldn't  
13 be part of the MOU on the 29th?

14 MS. HAYDEN: It could be. Well if we  
15 have a full MOU, it certainly would be. Actually  
16 that's a good point. By the 29th we should know  
17 which issues we have agreement on and which we don't.  
18 So I think, David, that actually makes perfect sense  
19 to me. By the 29th we should have a statement of  
20 facts which we agree upon which would include the  
21 design of -- would include the mitigation and the  
22 design of the mitigation, and then if the other  
23 issues, which I think are unrelated to that that are  
24 still open issues, would either be resolved or not.  
25 I think we can do that by the 29th.

1 MR. GRAYCK: If the agreement is we will  
2 try to agree on stipulated facts, that's fine, and  
3 I'm sure there are some that we will be able to, and  
4 to the extent we have a disagreement, that's fine.

5 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. Do any  
6 of the other parties have comments?

7 MR. EINHORN: This is Don from ANR.  
8 Kim, just trying to understand what exactly the  
9 issues are you will file on the 22nd. Is this some  
10 information concerning the proposed curtain drain and  
11 what's been described as other limited improvements?

12 MS. HAYDEN: It's the curtain drain and  
13 the swale, and it would be a memorandum from the --  
14 from John Stamatov who was the project manager who  
15 filed the original -- in whose name the original  
16 non-substantial change memorandum was submitted, and  
17 I'm going -- I'm looking at Josh Leckey. Is there  
18 any -- and then we have the memorandum from VHB that  
19 describes the curtain drain and there is a design  
20 that goes with that as well, correct, Josh? That's  
21 what we would submit on Friday.

22 MR. EINHORN: Okay.

23 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: If I could  
24 jump in real quick, on the 22nd with your submittal  
25 of additional facts regarding the curtain drain if

1 you could formally request that the Board hear this  
2 as opposed to the Hearing Officer and the reasons for  
3 that proposal to the Board.

4 MR. GRAYCK: And I'll let Kim do that.  
5 I don't have any objection to her request.

6 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Don, were you  
7 finished?

8 MR. EINHORN: Well the other thing is my  
9 understanding is there have been some discussions  
10 between VHB and our stormwater permitting person  
11 concerning generally this proposed work, and it would  
12 require an additional permit on that part or a  
13 permit. There are several ways going about choosing  
14 that. Presuming that what gets filed on the 22nd is  
15 fairly consistent, or I would say consistent with  
16 what we've been looking at, then I don't think  
17 anything would change and there would probably be not  
18 much need for ANR involvement other than some  
19 comments or requests of a condition on permits  
20 necessary to perform that work.

21 If something changes drastically, I  
22 can't, sitting here today, and it requires testimony  
23 or something from our stormwater program, I cannot  
24 sitting here today say when they are available.

25 MS. HAYDEN: Sure, and if I can respond,

1           there will be a filing with ANR on Friday and it will  
2           be the same filing. It will be a construction  
3           general permit application filing for this work. So  
4           it will be the same, Don, and I -- certainly you can  
5           -- obviously you should reserve the opportunity to  
6           react to those two filings. I don't foresee an issue  
7           with that.

8                         MR. GRAYCK: So if I can -- just so  
9           we're all clear, it's my understanding that VGS's  
10          position is that there's some -- some I'll call it  
11          work that is to be proposed, and while the Palmers  
12          and VGS haven't come to full agreement on the work to  
13          be completed VGS is going to propose some work to be  
14          done as part of addressing the reroute of the pipe  
15          off the Palmer's property. In other words, we're not  
16          -- VGS has not taken the position that no work, I  
17          hesitate to put the word remediation in front of it,  
18          but no work needs to be done for the pipeline  
19          relocation. You know what I mean, Kim? I just want  
20          to make sure --

21                        MS. HAYDEN: I guess given that we're  
22          working together in a settlement mode we're not  
23          waiving anything, but Vermont Gas is working  
24          earnestly and in good faith to provide a mitigation  
25          measure to address the issues that have been raised

1 with the hope and expectation that those mitigation  
2 measures, which would be in the form of a curtain  
3 drain and swale, will satisfy the Palmers, and I  
4 guess I would --

5 MR. GRAYCK: Fine. Thank you.

6 MS. HAYDEN: We would agree that  
7 mitigation become conditions to the NSC order and  
8 that's kind of where we are.

9 MR. GRAYCK: Assuming that's the basis  
10 of the filing you'll make on the 22nd and that  
11 whatever filing I might make on May 2nd would simply  
12 be to address differences in opinion as to what work  
13 should be done, what should be done not whether any  
14 work needs to be done, and I understand that VGS is  
15 not waiving any position it might want to take with  
16 respect to that issue.

17 MS. HAYDEN: Okay.

18 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Does anybody  
19 else have a comment now?

20 MS. PORTER: This is Louise at the  
21 Department. I think Don and ANR raised the one  
22 question I had, what if anything changed that would  
23 have an impact on ANR's concern. I think we've got  
24 an agreement as to how that would go forward.

25 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. Well I

1 was thinking about a couple of things. One was,  
2 first, as I had interjected earlier the need to  
3 request a hearing before the Board, but along with  
4 that is if there is a MOU, if there's an agreement  
5 between the parties as to what work, if any, needs to  
6 be done to accomplish this non-substantial change, if  
7 there's agreement there would not necessarily --  
8 there wouldn't be a need for a hearing on a site  
9 visit, and as with the remainder of the  
10 non-substantial change request it would simply be  
11 reviewed by the Board and factual update upon which  
12 the parties agree.

13 So I guess what I'm saying I'm  
14 encouraging the parties, inasmuch as it would speed  
15 up the process, that if an agreement can be achieved  
16 that would eliminate any need for either a Proposal  
17 for Decision or a hearing, and of course a site  
18 visit, so it would be basically additional facts that  
19 would be added to the existing facts that we already  
20 have with regard to NSC number four. So I'll toss  
21 that out there as an encouragement to the parties to  
22 achieve a MOU.

23 I can't promise that the Board will  
24 favorably receive the notion of my not hearing any  
25 technical hearing before they do. So, again, just an

1 encouragement to attempt to achieve agreement as to  
2 what the role should be, if any. Comments on what I  
3 said?

4 MS. HAYDEN: The one comment -- thank  
5 you. That is very helpful. The one comment that  
6 Vermont Gas would have is we are -- while we're  
7 encouraged that we've made significant progress we  
8 would like to have a hearing date set aside, and we  
9 will file something today officially requesting that  
10 the full Board sit on this and with the explanation  
11 which would be tied to schedule as to why we feel  
12 that's needed, but we have called in to the Clerk's  
13 Office and I'm wondering, we have not received back  
14 any confirmed dates, the parties have tried to work  
15 together and the 11th and 12th can work I think for  
16 the parties. We were not aware of whether that --  
17 and I understand, Mr. Tousley, that the 11th doesn't  
18 work for you. Maybe the 12th does. What's the most  
19 expeditious way of finding out what the Board's  
20 availability is so that we can try -- they can decide  
21 whether they want to sit on this but target some  
22 dates?

23 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: That would  
24 probably work for the Board. The reason I'm not  
25 available on the 11th is because it's a Board meeting

1 day and generally Hearing Officers are -- try not to  
2 schedule hearings on days when the Board is meeting  
3 because they like to yank us out of our office  
4 whenever they can and being in a hearing is not an  
5 excuse for not being available. We're encouraged not  
6 to do hearings on the dates the Board meets. That's  
7 why I'm not available on May 11th because it is a  
8 Board day. That doesn't mean the Board couldn't  
9 schedule a hearing itself that day, but I can't make  
10 that promise nor can Judy yet. That would have to be  
11 briefed to the Board along with your request for a  
12 hearing.

13 MS. HAYDEN: Okay.

14 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: The date -- if  
15 I'm hearing it and it's just myself as a Hearing  
16 Officer, I'm available -- I'm available just not on  
17 May 11th because it is a Board hearing date. I'm  
18 otherwise available.

19 MR. GRAYCK: So, for example, May 12th.

20 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: For example,  
21 May 12th, yes. I think the afternoon of May 12th the  
22 Board hearing room is in use for another hearing. So  
23 it would be the morning of May 12th.

24 MR. GRAYCK: Mr. Tousley, is there any  
25 possibility, that if you heard it as a Hearing

1 Officer, we could do a site visit and the hearing in  
2 Monkton or some local location? Do you ever do  
3 hearings outside of the Board hearing room, for  
4 example, either at a town office or -- I'm not  
5 familiar with your procedures the way Attorney Hayden  
6 is. I'm not a frequent flyer.

7 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: This is a post  
8 certification hearing which I think I can count on  
9 one hand the number the Board has ever done recently.  
10 There were a lot that were done a long time ago, but  
11 that can be done. I'm just wondering what's the  
12 purpose of the site visit? It's not required. I  
13 didn't anticipate doing one. I have been to the site  
14 already too.

15 MR. GRAYCK: I thought we would limit  
16 the site visits to simply the areas of the proposed  
17 work and that, you know, I wouldn't have any  
18 objection even to having the experts give explanation  
19 with the understanding that eventually it would have  
20 to be put on the record, but I thought perhaps it  
21 could be easier for everyone to understand what's  
22 agreed to and disagreed to if we are actually  
23 standing on the ground talking about it, but if not,  
24 if that's not how you do it, no problem.

25 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Well that's

1 conceivable and that's a good reason to do one if  
2 there is disagreement as to the appropriate scope, if  
3 any, of work to be done. So that -- and that might  
4 be a circumstance where the Board may want to attend  
5 the site visit rather than me so that -- but again  
6 that's -- that would be -- that would arise if there  
7 wasn't agreement among the parties as to what, if  
8 anything, should be done.

9 MS. PORTER: Mr. Tousley, I would  
10 question the wisdom of doing a hearing outside of the  
11 confines of the Board room given some of the things  
12 that we have encountered out in the field.

13 MS. HAYDEN: And I agree with Mr.  
14 Grayck. This is Kim. We are very concerned about  
15 frankly the eminent domain proceedings have been --  
16 site visits have been blocked. There's been a lot of  
17 protester activity and I think -- and given that the  
18 full Board has already visited this site and, you  
19 know, and the Hearing Officer has and because of the  
20 concerns about protester activity I think we would be  
21 -- that could actually create more problems than help  
22 the situation. I don't know that there's any way  
23 that we could control protesters from intervening and  
24 disrupting a site visit.

25 MR. GRAYCK: And just to address that

1 issue I would like everyone to know that I have  
2 communicated with my clients about this and I've made  
3 it very clear to them that obstruction in this  
4 instance would be detrimental and they understand  
5 that. Of course I acknowledge for them that they  
6 can't control people, but I know that they would make  
7 clear that a disruption would not be helpful for what  
8 it's worth. I have raised this issue with my  
9 clients. I want everyone to know that and I've made  
10 it very clear it's detrimental to their interests for  
11 this to become a disruptive process and that's not a  
12 situation I'm interested in. My clients did ask to  
13 remind everyone that I guess on the site visit to  
14 their property in September of 2013 they had cider  
15 and doughnuts ready.

16 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: I'll remind  
17 folks that only Chairman Volz of the Board has been  
18 to the site, not Ms. Cheney and Ms. Hofmann haven't  
19 been. The other Board membership did the site visit  
20 a couple years ago. In any event I think there would  
21 be a hesitancy to conduct a site visit without some  
22 compelling reason because of what we've seen in the  
23 recent condemnation cases and the relation this would  
24 have to that as well. So I don't mean to put the  
25 fire out on a potential site visit, but it's highly

1 unlikely unless there's a really good need.

2 Okay. Well I think where we're at right  
3 now is asking the parties to attempt to develop an  
4 agreement and waiting for some filings on the 22nd of  
5 April from VGS as well as potentially either on the  
6 29th from VGS or on the 2nd from the Palmers, as well  
7 as I think Mr. Einhorn said something about maybe  
8 potential for filing some kind of comment related to  
9 the April 22nd filing, if necessary, from ANR. Did I  
10 capture what we summarized where we're at?

11 MR. EINHORN: Yes, and I expect to file  
12 a comment in response to that filing. I also intend  
13 to supplement our comments from back in November when  
14 we had asked the Board to stay this matter until we  
15 had received and reviewed the applications to amend  
16 the collateral permits, and we have seen and we have  
17 reviewed those, and at this point I think we're in a  
18 position to comment that aside from this new wrinkle  
19 here the proposed non-substantial change request four  
20 is fine with the Agency provided that the collateral  
21 amendments are complied with.

22 MS. PALMER: This is Jane Palmer. I  
23 just joined the conference call.

24 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Well, Ms.  
25 Palmer, this is Mr. Tousley, the Hearing Officer.

1 We're basically right now just concluding on schedule  
2 as to the next event that may arise. The next one is  
3 a filing by VGS on April 22nd. Additional  
4 information about potential mitigation follows on  
5 either April 29th by MOU filed by VGS or on May 2nd  
6 with additional testimony filed by the Palmers, and  
7 the potential as well for additional information to  
8 be filed by ANR on either the 29th of April or May  
9 2nd. I think that's where we're at; is that correct?

10 MR. GRAYCK: Yes as far as I'm  
11 concerned.

12 MR. EINHORN: Yes.

13 MS. HAYDEN: Yes as far as Vermont Gas  
14 is concerned.

15 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Department?

16 MS. PORTER: I would agree.

17 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. Great.

18 Okay. Do we have other business that we can take  
19 care of today?

20 MR. GRAYCK: Yes. I just have one  
21 question. Back on it was November 25th when we were  
22 asked to file comments, reply to the fourth  
23 non-substantial, my filing included an affidavit with  
24 exhibits of Mr. Heindel. If we're proceeding to the  
25 hearings, do those need to be refiled with the Board

1 or would they be part -- would it just be simply  
2 sufficient to move them into -- move to admit them  
3 into evidence at a hearing? I just don't know how  
4 you do it.

5 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: There would be  
6 no need to refile them.

7 MR. GRAYCK: Okay. All right. It is  
8 already with the Board the affidavit and exhibits A  
9 through D filed on November 25, 2015. Okay.

10 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: And I would  
11 suggest that if you have a MOU that it reflects prior  
12 filings like that one and indicates any agreements  
13 between the parties to admit that into evidence for  
14 the Board's consideration. Were there other  
15 comments?

16 MS. PORTER: Nothing else from the  
17 Department.

18 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. I think  
19 that means we're done now. Thank you very much folks  
20 for your time and I'll look forward to these future  
21 filings, as well as I may ask VGS to put forward the  
22 filing proposed schedule that reflects our discussion  
23 today with the dates April 22nd for -- they can file  
24 that with their proposed schedule. They can file the  
25 additional information as well as the request for the

1 Board to hear it if there's a technical hearing, and  
2 then the May 29 -- the April 29th and May 2nd dates.  
3 So just an additional request that would be part of  
4 -- additional filing that would be part of the April  
5 22nd filing if that's possible.

6 MS. HAYDEN: That's certainly possible.  
7 We'll do that.

8 HEARING OFFICER TOUSLEY: Okay. Great.  
9 Is there anything else we need to do today? Great.  
10 Thank you all for your time. Have a good afternoon.

11 (Whereupon, the proceeding was  
12 adjourned at 3 p.m.)
